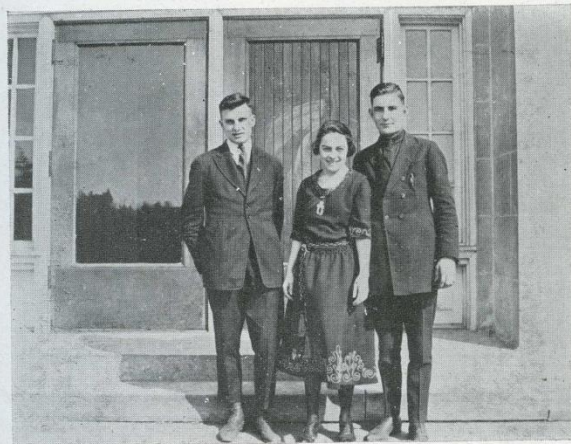

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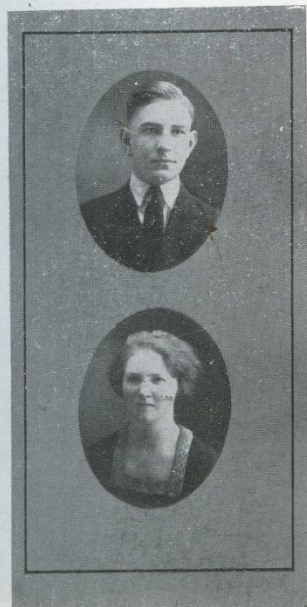

Who makes the bubble of life worth while.



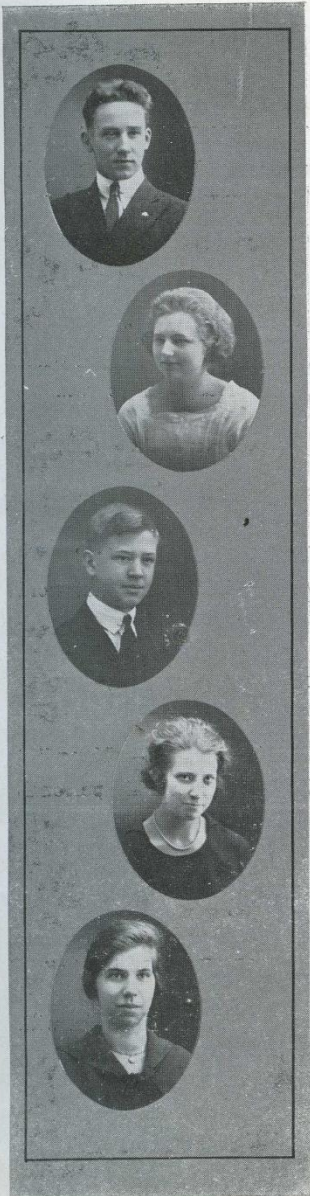
RUSSELL HELGESON—"Russ"

once.



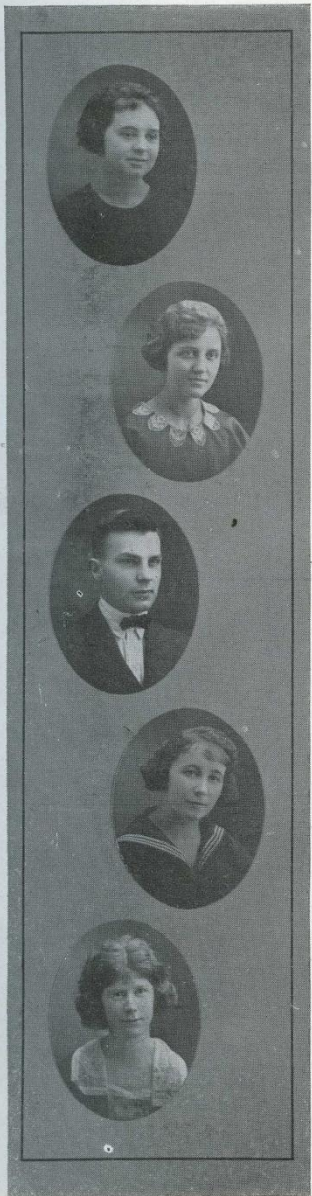
ALLAN McRAE—"Mac"
